- 1. Menorah Has seven branches, was used to light up the temple
- 2. Torah Scroll Parchment and ink hold the most sacred and ancient text
- Ark A decorated cabinet situated in the center of the room, that keeps the Torah scrolls safe
- **4. Siddur -** A book used throughout the year to follow the order of prayer
- 5. Mahzor A book used on special holidays to follow the order of prayer
- 6. Chumash A book that holds the weekly portion
- 7. **Stander -** a piece of furniture that serves as a place to put your siddur and lean on
- 8. **Bima -** An elevated area, somewhat like a table, where the Torah is placed when read
- Magen David A geometric symbol attributed to a famous red-head king from the past
- 10. Seats A place to sit
- 11. **Tzedakah box** An object whose purpose is to deposit charity and help others
- 12. Parochet A curtain-like, decorated piece of fabric that covers the ark.
- **13. Ner Tamid** An eternal light, reminiscent of the one in the temple, situated over the arc.
- **14. Bulletin board -** This object hold valuable information like prayer times and announcements
- 15. **Tablets -** A two-piece object that contains the 10 commandments
- 16. Talit A prayer shawl
- 17. **Kippa -** A small accessory that is customary to wear on one's head to symbolize the connection to God and Judaism
- **18. Mechitzah** An object that separates different areas of the synagogue, often has a piece of fabric too
- **19. Eliyahu's Chair -** is a special unoccupied chair that is reserved during the Jewish ceremony of circumcision Brit milah
- **20.** Pasuk/Psukim Biblical verses These sacred texts often decorate the synagogue, and one can usually find at least one over the Torah ark.
