2) Babylonian Talmud Tractate Yomah 86a

Rabbi Ḥama bar Ḥanina said: Great is repentance, as it brings healing to the world, as it is stated: "I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely" (Hosea 14:5).

3) Hoshea 14:2-6

Return, O Israel, to the ETERNAL your God, for you have fallen because of your sin.

Take words with you and return to GOD. Say: "Forgive all guilt and accept what is good; Instead of bulls we will pay [The offering of] our lips.

Assyria shall not save us, no more will we ride on steeds; Nor ever again will we call our handiwork our god, since in You alone orphans find pity!" I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely; For My anger has turned away from them (lit. him).

I will be to Israel like dew; He shall blossom like the lily, He shall strike root like a Lebanon tree.

4) Babylonian Talmud Tractate Yomah 86b

It was taught in a *baraita* that Rabbi Meir would say: Great is repentance because the entire world is forgiven on account of one individual who repents, as it is stated: "I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely; for My anger has turned away from him" (Hosea 14:5). It does not say: From them, i.e., from the sinners, but "from him," i.e., from that individual.

5) Dr. Erica Brown, Return; Daily Inspiration for the Days of Awe, Epilogue; The Day After

In the last chapter of the Talmudic tractate Yoma, our sages of old debated the merits of repentance and its limitations. What can teshuva change and what can it not change? In one particularly moving passage, different rabbis put forward noble statements about why teshuva is an incredible gift, usually based on a close reading of a biblical verse.

Rabbi Hama bar Hanina began the great debate, held in Socratic style. "Great is repentance," he believed, "for it brings healing to the world, as it is said: 'I will heal their backsliding. I will love them freely' (Hosea 14:5)." Through the act of teshuva, God is able to hold us up to our own best standard. When we find ourselves sliding back into a place we never wanted to go, we remind ourselves that we can change and that the change will bring inner healing to ourselves and the world. God loves us freely and unconditionally, but it is harder to feel that love when there is too much distance. Close the gap.
