

Jewish Futures: Holding Hope Cultivating *Tikvah*/Hope as a *Middah*: Making a Way Out of No Way Rabbi Marc Margolius, Institute for Jewish Spirituality (<u>jewishspirituality.org</u>)

Dr. Martin Luther King. Jr., address to the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, August 16, 1967: When our days become dreary with low-hovering clouds of despair, and when our nights become darker than a thousand midnights, let us remember that there is a creative force in this universe, working to pull down the gigantic mountains of evil, <u>a power that is able to make a way out of no way</u> and transform dark yesterdays into bright tomorrows. Let us realize the arc of the moral universe is long but it bends toward justice.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks: "Future Tense," The Jewish Chronicle, April 1, 2008: To be a Jew is to be an agent of hope in a world serially threatened by despair. Every ritual, every mitzvah, every syllable of the Jewish story, every element of Jewish law, is a protest against escapism, resignation or the blind acceptance of fate. Judaism is a sustained struggle, the greatest ever known, against the world that is, in the name of the world that could be, should be, but is not yet. There is no more challenging vocation. Throughout history, when human beings have sought hope they have found it in the Jewish story. Judaism is the religion, and Israel the home, of hope.

Rabbi Sacks, "Optimism is all very well, but it takes courage to hope," The Times, 4/30/2010: Optimism is the belief that the world is changing for the better; hope is the belief that, together, we can *make* the world better. Optimism is a passive virtue, hope an active one. It needs no courage, only a certain naiveté, to be an optimist. It needs a great deal of courage to have hope. The prophets of Israel were not optimists. When everyone else felt secure, they saw the coming catastrophe. But every one of them was an agent of hope.

Now the soul comes into being primarily through the longing and yearning which a Jew has for God—each person commensurate with their level, that they yearn, long and crave to reach the next level. Through these yearnings a soul is created, as is written, "My soul yearns and pines" (Psalm 84:3). In other words, that which I yearn and pine for God, from this itself "my soul" is created.
