Over 65 degrees, dry

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INSTRUCTIONS FOR ICE BLOCK PAINTING

- Lit ice painting
- Flashlight
- Clear Plastic Bin
- Paint Brushes
- Block of Ice ~ freeze your own or buy one
- Tray to catch the melting, painty water
- Liquid Watercolors or watered down Tempera Paint
- Rock Salt


INSTRUCTIONS FOR GLOW STICK PAINTING

• Making glow stick ice painting

- Materials needed to make a **Glow Stick Ice Painting**:
- Glow Sticks we used both the skinny bracelets and the thicker glow sticks. Both worked great
- Thick Ice Block thick enough to make sure that it won't crack when you drill holes in it.
- Electric Drill please take precautions when using power tools
- Drill Bits find one that is just larger than the glow stick. We also used a drill bit extender.
- Water Color paints
- Paint Brushes
- Course Salt
- Tray to catch any of the drips
- We drilled about 4 holes into our ice block deep enough to hide a Glow stick in. One of the things that we found out the hard way was to keep the drill moving. If you let the drill sit in the ice it will freeze there. Oops. The ice eventually melts so you will get it back, it might just take a while;)

•Switch on the Night by Ray Bradbury Alfred Knof About a little boy who doesn't like night until he meets a little girl called "Dark" who shows him wonderful things about night.

•Who's Afraid of the Dark? by Crosby Bonsai Harper and Row A sister gives her little brother advice on how to help his dog get over being scared of the dark

•**Owl Babies** by Martin Waddell Candlewick Press Three owl babies worry about when their mother will return in the night

•Goodnight Mr Night by Dan Yaccarino Each evening gentle Mr Night walks the earth closing flowers, etc. When you see him, you know its time for bed •Look at the Moon by Mary Garelick The moon sees many animals that come out when its out

•Good Night Moon by Margaret Wise Brown

•Wait Til the Moon is Full by Margaret Wise Brown A raccoon waits for the full moon to explore in the dark with the moon lighting his way

•**The Dream Eater** by Christian Garrison Bradbury Press An oriental tale of a village that is plagued by bad dreams and what happens when a little boy saves a creature named Baku.

•The Dreamcatcher by Audrey Osofsky Orchard Books An Ojibway story about a mother making a dream catcher for her baby's bad dreams
•The Night World by Mordechai Gerstein PJ Library Boy experiences the magic of sunrise

What does SUCCESS look like?

Did the children work collaboratively? Did whatever they created stay up? Did the children go back to it, to do the activity in the same way (shows they are processing) or bring other materials to incorporate? Were the children able to be independent in their explorations?

Did they ask questions, make predictions, observations?
