

#### Meaningful Youth Engagement

#### Introduction to Meaningful Youth Engagement

"Meaningful adolescent and youth engagement is an inclusive, intentional, mutually-respectful partnership between adolescents, youth, and adults whereby power is shared, respective contributions are valued, and young people's ideas, perspectives, skills, and strengths are integrated into the design and delivery of programs, strategies, policies, funding mechanisms, and organizations that affect their lives and their communities, countries, and world"

-Global Consensus Statement on Meaningful Youth Engagement



#### Why is Meaningful Youth Engagement Important?

- It's more effective
- Youth are the experts of their own lives
- Supports adolescent development
- It's the right thing to do

Rung 8 - Youth initiated shared decisions with adults

Rung 7 - Youth initiated and directed

Rung 6 - Adult initiated shared decisions with youth

You lead a teen group and decide to start a book club. You assign sections of Sexual Citizens for participants to discuss at the first meeting.

#### **Core Elements**

- Youth provide input and feedback at all stages
- Power sharing
- Reframe youth as partners, not as beneficiaries
- Trust of young people
- Be aligned on expected outcomes
- Including youth from marginalized communities
- Examining the role of stigma, bias, and judgement
- Skill building for young people
- Transparency and inclusivity
- Young people have decision making power





#### Scenario A

Your synagogue puts on an annual teen Purim party. In the past, you've heard from some teens that there have been issues with sexual harassment and pressure to hook up during the party. What are ways you can integrate Meaningful Youth Engagement strategies into the Purim Party this year?



#### Scenario B

Your organization has decided to have a seminar each year for teens on consent, sexuality, and healthy relationships. Last year was the first year of the seminar, and your organization brought in an outside speaker. The teens were very quiet during the seminar and there was minimal participation. As you are planning for this year's seminar, what are ways you can integrate Meaningful Youth Engagement strategies?



#### Scenario C

Your organization is going through a renovation and leadership has proposed a teen space. How can you apply Meaningful Youth Engagement strategies into the design of the new space?



#### Scenario D

You are organizing a weekend Shabbaton for your youth group. In the past, the organization has written a code of conduct for young people to follow for the weekend. What are ways you can integrate Meaningful Youth Engagement strategies into the code of conduct for this year?



### MYE Strategies for working with teens on consent and hookup culture

#### Committees

Are youth on them or is there a youth advisory board?

#### Community dialogue

- Are young people involved in planning and facilitating?
   Are they being given the knowledge and skills to be able to support planning?
- Incorporating youth into decision making process
  - Are young people part of making decisions?

#### - Training

What training are youth being given? Are youth being consulted or reviewing materials?



## MYE Strategies for working with teens on consent and hookup culture

- Supporting victim-survivors
  - Information or training on responding to a disclosure since are most likely to get one as a peer
  - Youth-friendly resources
- Hiring and screening
  - Are young people involved in hiring decisions at all?
- Safe spaces and assessment
  - Are youth part of the process?
- Evaluation
  - Are you getting youth input? Are they designing and/or reviewing evaluation tools to give feedback?
