MILITARY OCCUPATION (definition)



The quick responses





Jewish Israelis are not one racial group



20% of the Israeli population are Arab-Israelis who have full rights as citizens.

Some are justices of the Supreme Court and members of Knesset (Israeli Parliament).



Adding complexity

Why do people still think Israel is an apartheid state?


"Judea and Samaria are under Israeli military rule, but the Palestinian inhabitants there are not Israeli citizens. This fact casts serious doubt on the democratic character of the State of Israel."

What's the **best argument** about why Israel might be an apartheid state?

Palestinians in the West Bank and East Jerusalem are not Israeli citizens and are subject to different laws than Israelis



- → Palestinians in the West Bank/East
 Jerusalem hold different passports
 than Israelis
- → Restrictions on movement: different passports, checkpoints, roads, the separation barrier.
- Descendents of refugees are not allowed to return
- → The Nation State Law (2018) emphasizes that Israel is primarily a *Jewish state*, and not a state of all its citizens

How might we move our students beyond the easy answers to grappling with the complex problems that Israel faces?

Can we help students differentiate between two separate conversations:

- 1. Is Israel an apartheid state?
- 2. What inequalities exist in Israeli society?
 - How did this situation come to be?
 - What are the different opinions in Israel about how to navigate these challenges?

SETTLER COLONIALISM (definition)

the policy or practice of acquiring full or partial political control over another country, occupying it with settlers, and exploiting it economically.

The quick responses

Continual Jewish presence in the Land of Israel



Jews are not colonizers since there has been a continual Jewish presence in the Land of Israel

Colonialism and economic exploitation



A key feature of colonialism is economic exploitation in service of a foreign homeland. Zionists were not serving a foreign power and therefore cannot be defined as colonizers.


Why do people still think Zionism is colonialism?

The percentage of Jewish inhabitants grew in the early 1900's, while the Muslim percentage decreased

Early Zionist leaders used the term colonialism when describing the goals of Zionism

Student prompts/ Essential questions

Is there a difference between "colonising" and "colonialism"?

What factors determine whether a people are indigenous to a land?

Under what circumstances can people immigrate to another land?

Can refugees be colonialists?

"In case of Americans, often they'll see race as if Israeli Jews are white people and Palestinian Muslims are black people...

There are Americans who really believe that a country thousands of miles away which has a completely different history, completely unrelated to race in America, somehow maps onto America's racial preoccupations... because that's the skeleton in their closet...

There's a history of projecting whatever ills you see in the world onto Jewish people and then condemning them as the avatars of the ills that you see."



The "End the Occupation" woman focuses on long lines outside military checkpoints, soldiers arresting Palestinians in the middle of the night, and the large cement wall cutting Palestinians off from their land.

To her, what is happening beyond the Green Line is military occupation of the Palestinian people.

The "homeland" woman is telling the story of biblical connection between Jews and Judea, where Abraham and Isaac and Rachel and Leah and Rebecca once walked... For her, there is an inherent right for Jews to return to their (theological and historical) homes.

These two women are clearly in disagreement — but they're having two separate conversations... If we can separate the conversation into the status of the land and the experience of those who live in it, then we can bring the two women from Prima Kings into conversation with each other: we can discuss Jewish legacy without refuting Palestinian reality.


