## The debate surrounding the hostages

#### Victory is returning the hostages

Hostages first

## "Total victory" is the return of the remaining hostages.

Despite the danger Hamas poses if left in power, "the only way of getting all of the 101 Israeli hostages home is through an agreement with them."

Hostages may be in fragile medical condition - time is running out

Hamas has executed hostages when fearing IDF rescue

IDF has severely reduced Hamas capabilities in Gaza and turned its attention to the north. Now is the time for a deal!

#### Victory means destroying Hamas

No to an irresponsible deal

#### Israel must not make a deal until it has achieved its war objectives against Hamas.

Only military pressure will lead to the release of hostages.

Releasing terrorists puts Israel at risk for future attacks and kidnappings.

Leaving Hamas in power puts southern residents in danger and risks another Oct. 7th






## Student Assignment Examples

- → Spectrum: Agree/Disagree with different statements.
- → Think/Pair/Share and then Mentimeter.
- → Imagine you are on a Knesset committee tasked to submit a memo that considers both sides, and then take an opinion.
- → Role play: Ask students to take on roles of different stakeholders (Israeli government official, family member of hostage, IDF officer, resident of the South, US ambassador). What do they think Israel should do? Then, debrief, and consider your own opinion.



# Was Israel *correct to attack Iran* or should it have *avoided a direct attack*?

Should Israel have *gone even further in its attack*, striking oil or nuclear sites? Or, should Israel have *held back its attack* to avoid retaliation?

## Was Israel correct to strike Iran directly?

#### For striking Iran

Eliminate the source: Direct action could neutralize the core of Iran's support for proxy groups like Hamas & Hezbollah, cutting off funding and weapons supplies.

**Deterrence**: A strong response against Iran may deter future aggression from Iran and its proxies across the region.

**Prevent future threats**: A direct strike could be seen as a preemptive strike to prevent Iran from producing further ballistic missiles, however this stopped short of targeting Iran's nuclear program.

### **Against** striking Iran

**Escalation risk**: A war with Iran could trigger a wider regional conflict, involving multiple countries, Iranian proxies and worsening instability. Iran has also threatened to retaliate.

**Economic toll**: A full-scale war with Iran could drain Israel's resources, disrupt its economy, and strain its military capacity over an extended period.

International backlash: Direct confrontation with Iran could isolate Israel diplomatically, especially if civilian casualties rise, leading to loss of international support. The USA specifically asked Israel to limit the nature of its strikes.



BREAKING: Iran has launched ballistic missiles toward Israel. Civilians ordered into bomb shelters.



## The debate surrounding Ultra Orthodox & the IDF

#### For drafting Haredim

The IDF needs more reservists to fight this war. Current reservists have spent months since Oct. 7 in the army and need relief.

It isn't fair that some people in Israel have to serve in the army while others don't.

It is possible to combine Torah learning and army service. The *hesder* program(rabbinical academies that combine Torah learning and army service) is proof.

#### **Against** drafting Haredim

Many Haredim fear that the IDF will cause young Haredim to become less religious.

The IDF does not accommodate Haredi religious needs.

The IDF lacks the framework to draft so many new soldiers with specific religious needs.

The Haredim believe that Torah learning is just as important to Israel's survival as the military.

How might citizens balance their responsibility to a state with their own religious beliefs?



cartooningisrael This cartoon by Reut Bortz captures the fears, anxieties and realities that many Israeli kids and parents are feeling as they go back to school this week. As the kids walk under a balloon awning welcoming them to school, their backpacks reveal the traumas they have experienced over the past year. This includes kids who have been displaced from the north and the south, parents who have been wounded or killed, and siblings who have been taken captive. In the background is the illustrator talking to her friend who says "their backpacks get heavier each vear".

This cartoon resonates with me because of Bortz's focus on the children and how the war has taken away their innocence and how despite their parents best efforts to normalize things, they carry this baggage with them into their lives. @comicsairl

cartooningisrael My (cartoon) feeds are mostly populated by cartoons that are either celebrating Israel's military successes in Iran or are critical of the Israeli government for having not yet brought all of the captives home. What I like about David Palma's recent cartoon is how he tries to strike a balance between the two. Though the cartoon is certainly left-leaning - the pilots plan to rendezvous on Kaplan Street for a protest - the air force is depicted in a way that celebrates its military achievements. Palma's cartoon rejects the binary that one is either for or against what is happening in the country and instead shows that things are much more complicated and nuanced. The cartoon recognizes soldiers' abilities to be committed to a cause or an idea - defeating Iran, bringing back the hostages, lovalty to the state of Israel and its people - even as they oppose the government in power. This idea is not new and was something talked about very early in the war but Palma is returning to it here at a moment when Israeli society is becoming divided and he reinforces the idea that Israeli soldiers will do everything necessary to protect the Israeli people.

### What happened?

Former U.S. President Donald Trump won a second term in Tuesday's

presidential elections, defeating current Vice President Kamala Harris in an overwhelming victory in which Trump won not only the electoral college, but the popular vote as well. What does this mean for Israel and the Jewish community?

### Why does this matter?

In his first term, Trump was staunchly pro-Israel, recognizing Israel's sovereignty over disputed areas such as the Golan Heights, moving the U.S. embassy to Jerusalem, implementing harsh sanctions against Iran, and finalizing the Abraham Accords between Israel and several Arab states.

However, some of his statements leading up to his victory have raised questions about how his second term will look for Israel.

For one, Trump has repeatedly said that he wants the war in Gaza to end soon, although what exactly he means by that isn't so clear. Some Israeli officials are concerned Trump could use pressure levers such as military aid to force Israel into a ceasefire, no matter the conditions it has to agree to. A spokesperson for the Republican Party stressed after the election that Trump meant that he wants working with the new administration and Congress to promote our values, fight

antisemitism, secure our community, and maintain steadfast support for Israel."

Many Israelis, however, welcomed Trump's win, expressing hope that he would be less critical of Israel than the Biden administration. Billboards congratulating the president-elect were set up right after the elections in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu called the win "history's greatest comeback" and a "powerful recommitment to the great alliance between Israel and America."

A survey by the Israel Democracy Institute found that nearly two-thirds of Israelis believed Trump would be better for Israel than Harris.

Israel's Channel 14, affiliated with the right wing, <u>celebrated</u> Trump's win live with singing and l'chaims.

#### **Essential questions:**

- What was your reaction to the results of the U.S. presidential election? How do you think it will impact Israel, the Jewish community and the rise in antisemitism?
- The majority of American Jews supported Kamala Harris for president while the majority of Israeli Jews supported the election of Donald Trump. Why do you think the two communities viewed the candidates so differently? Do they have different priorities? What factors impact these different worldviews?
- Put yourself in the shoes of the American president. What should U.S. support for Israel look like during this war? Explain your perspective.
  - Supplying defensive military technology to Israel e.g. missile defense systems
  - Fighting with Israel if required e.g. in an attack on Iranian nuclear facilities
  - PR and international diplomacy
  - · Holding Israel to account morally
  - Something else

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
