# **LESSON PLAN**



Theme Shavuot

Grade Level(s)

Time of lesson 45 Minutes

3-5th Grade

## **Key Ideas**

- Shavuot is the Jewish holiday that celebrates the giving of the Torah to the Jewish people at Mount Sinai,
- · Shavuot is an agricultural festival.
- Shavuot is a holiday that emphasizes gratitude, learning and the connection between Jewish tradition and nature.
- · Foods associated with Shavuot include dairy products, symbolizing the sweetness of the Torah.

## **Learning Outcomes**

#### Students will:

- Understand the historical and religious significance of Shavuot.
- Explain the connection between Shavuot and the giving of the Torah.
- Recognize foods and practices associated with Shavuot.
- Demonstrate an understanding of Shavuot through a creative activity.

## Materials & Resources

- · Whiteboard & markers
- Age appropriate story/video about the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai
- · Paper, crayons or markers
- · Book or visual resource about Shavuot customs.
- Shavuot word search (included)
- Paper version of the 10 Commandments (included)
- · Samples of dairy food (optional)
- · Picture of Mt. Sinai or a map of Israel

### Warm-up and Overview

#### Brainstorm:

Ask students to share what Shavuot is, how it is celebrated or any information about the holiday that they
can share with the class. Write their responses on the board.

Introduce the Holiday: Explain that Shavuot is an important Jewish holiday and share a brief overview.

- · It's a celebration of the Torah
- · It's an agricultural holiday in Israel
- People eat dairy foods to celebrate the sweetness of the Torah.

#### Introduction

#### Story or Video

- Share a story or video about the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. (suggestion: The Littlest Mountain by: Kar Ben Publishing)
- Explain that Shavuot marks the moment when the Jewish People received the Ten Commandments and Torah from God. Talk about the idea of receiving wisdom and the Torah people a guide in peoples lives.

## **Specific Accomodations**

- Have visual aids available such as maps, pictures and drawings to highlight important places/concepts.
- Have copies of the book available for students to have in front of them and be able to follow along.



## Activity

Individual 10 Commandments Project

**Instructions:** Each student will create their own "10 Commandments" and relate each commandment to their everyday life.

- Explain to the class what the 10 Commandments are: a set of rules/guidelines given to the Jewish people in the Torah that teach us how we should behave towards God and one another.
- Read aloud all 10 Commandments (use visuals)
- Ask students for examples on how these commandments are relative to them today. How can you honor your parents? What does it mean not to steal?
- Have students think of a situation or example from their own life where each commandment applies. Have them work in pairs or small groups to discuss these ideas.
- After the small group discussion, students will choose one or two commandments that stand out to them. They will use the 10 Commandment outline to draw/write/create symbols that represent how they can follow those commandments in their own life.

## **Options for Extensions**

- Ask students to go home and follow one of these commandments for homework and share about it in the next class.
- Introduce "Commandment of the Week" where you choose one to practice with intention that week.
- Shavuot word search for those who finish early.

## Options for Remediation

- Simplify the language you are using for the 10 Commandments.
- Provide examples that are more relatable to a particular students everyday experiences.
- Share simple stories about following/breaking these commandments to make the concepts more tangible.

## Review and Closing

- Once they complete their 10 Commandments, invite students to share one or two that they illustrated with the class and explain how they related them to their life.
- Have a class discussion about how we can help each other follow the 10 Commandments in our daily actions and words.
- Have a sweet dairy snack to share with the class symbolizing the sweetness of the Torah.

## Specific Accomodations

- Provide visual aids (a poster displaying the 10 Commandments, map/photo of Mt. Sinai etc.)
- Simplify the language for each commandment.

## Checking for Understanding

- Throughout the lesson, ask students to give a thumbs up if they understand, a thumbs sideways if they are unsure, or a thumbs down if they are not understanding.
- Circulate to groups during project time to check in with students, especially those who may be struggling to complete the work.
